- 1. The name for the Persian New Year is <u>Norooz</u>. It translates to "New Day".
- 2. In Iran, the New Year is celebrated on the first day of <u>spring</u>.









- 3. For the month before Norooz, people spend their time <u>cleaning</u> the house thoroughly.
- The stores are busy with people <u>shopping</u> for new outfits for the Norooz parties, and all the ingredients for an amazing Norooz meal.
- 5. <u>Chahar Shanbeh Soori</u> is the last Wednesday before Norooz.
- 6. Families gather together and build small <u>bonfires</u> in the streets and jump over the fire.
- 7. People go through the streets banging on pots and pans with <u>spoons</u>, knocking on doors and asking for treats. This is called "Qashohg-Zany," or "<u>spoon beating</u>." They are clearing the way for good luck in the New Year!
- 8. The music of <u>Haji Firouz</u> in the streets fills everyone with excitement! His songs mean Norooz is just around the corner!









- 9. A special <u>Haft Seen</u> table is set in the home. It will have seven items on it that begin with the sound "S." Each item symbolizes something good for the New Year.
- 10. At the exact moment when the sun crosses the <u>equator</u> signaling the beginning of spring, the family gathers around the Haft Seen table. They wish each other, "Aideh Shomah Mobarak!" or "Happy New Year!"
- 11. The children receive "<u>Aide</u>," a gift of new paper money or shiny coins, from all the adult relatives.
- 12. They share a special New Year's meal of "Sabzi Polo Mahi," or fish and <u>rice</u> with herbs, and "Kookoo Sabzi."
- 13. For twelve days, when schools and many businesses are closed, they celebrate Norooz by <u>visiting</u> their friends and family.
- 14. On the thirteenth day, called "<u>Seezdeh Bedar</u>," or "going out on the thirteenth," everyone heads outdoors for a <u>picnic</u>. This is the last day of the New Year holiday.
